November is Diabetes Awareness Month

Las Clinicas del Norte offers Diabetic Promotora Services at the three main clinic sites. The services include education, support and meal planning. Ask your provider to recommend the services.

Diabetes Symptoms:* The following symptoms of diabetes are typical. However, some people with type 2 diabetes have symptoms so mild that they go unnoticed. Common symptoms of diabetes:

Urinating often

Feeling very thirsty

Feeling very hungry - even though you are eating Extreme fatigue

Blurry vision

Cuts/bruises that are slow to heal

(type 1) Weight loss - even though you are eating more

(type 2) Tingling, pain, or numbness in the hands/ feet

Type 1 Diabetes:

In most cases of type 1 diabetes, people need to inherit risk factors from both parents. We think these factors must be more common in whites because whites have the highest rate of type 1 diabetes.

Because most people who are at risk do not get diabetes, researchers want to find out what the environmental triggers are.

- One trigger might be related to cold weather.
 Type 1 diabetes develops more often in winter than summer and is more common in places with cold climates.
- Another trigger might be viruses. Perhaps a virus that has only mild effects on most people triggers type 1 diabetes in others.
- Early diet may also play a role. Type 1 diabetes is less common in people who were breastfed and in those who first ate solid foods at later ages.

Type 1 Diabetes: Your Child's Risk

- In general, if you are a man with type 1 diabetes, the odds of your child developing diabetes are 1 in 17.
- If you are a woman with type 1 diabetes and your child was born before you were 25, your child's risk is 1 in 25; if your child was born after you turned 25, your child's risk is 1 in 100.
- Your child's risk is doubled if you developed diabetes before age 11. If both you and your partner have type 1 diabetes, the risk is between 1 in 10 and 1 in 4.

Type 2 Diabetes:

Type 2 diabetes has a stronger link to family history and lineage than type 1, although it too depends on environmental factors. Cont'd ⇒

Studies of twins have shown that genetics play a very strong role in the development of type 2 diabetes.

Lifestyle also influences the development of type 2 diabetes. Obesity, a condition in which a greater than normal amount of fat is in the body (more severe than overweight). and having a body mass index of 30 or more, tends to run in families as families generally have similar eating and exercise habits.

If you have a family history of type 2 diabetes, it may be difficult to figure out whether your diabetes is due to lifestyle factors or genetic susceptibility. Most likely it is due to both.

However, don't lose heart. Studies show that it is possible to delay or prevent type 2 diabetes by exercising and losing weight.

Type 2 Diabetes: Your Child's Risk

Type 2 diabetes runs in families. In part, this tendency is due to children learning bad habits — eating a poor diet, not exercising — from their parents. But there is also a genetic basis.

In general, if you have type 2 diabetes, the risk of your child getting diabetes is 1 in 7 if you were diagnosed before age 50 and 1 in 13 if you were diagnosed after age 50.

Some scientists believe that a child's risk is greater when the parent with type 2 diabetes is the mother. If both you and your partner have type 2 diabetes, your child's risk is about 1 in 2.

Complications

Diabetes remains the 7th leading cause of death in the United States in 2010, with 69,071 death certificates listing it as the underlying cause of death, and a total of 234,051 death certificates listing diabetes as an underlying or contributing cause of death.
