What is Hospice?

Considered to be the model for quality, compassionate care for people facing a life-limiting illness or injury, hospice and palliative care involve a team-oriented approach to expert medical care, pain management, and emotional and spiritual support expressly tailored to the patient's needs and wishes. Support is provided to the patient's loved ones as well.

The focus of hospice relies on the belief that each of us has the right to die pain-free and with dignity, and that our loved ones will receive the necessary support to allow us to do so. It is not only where you go when there is "nothing else to be done". Hospice is the "something more" that can be done for the patient and family when the illness cannot be cured. It is a concept based on comfort-oriented care. The focus is on caring, not curing, and in most cases:

- Care is provided to you in your own home.
- Hospice care also can be provided in freestanding hospice facilities, hospitals, and nursing homes and other long-term care facilities.
- Hospice services are available to patients of any age, religion, race, or illness.
- Hospice care is covered under most private insurance plans, Medicare, Medicaid, HMOs, and other managed care organizations.

How Does Hospice Work?

Hospice care is for any person who has a life-threatening or terminal illness from which they are not expected to live more than 6 months. Most reimbursement sources require a *prognosis of six months or less if the illness runs its normal course*. This does not mean care will not continue if the patient lives beyond that time.

Patients with both cancer and non-cancer illnesses are eligible to receive hospice care. This means the patient has chosen not to treat the disease assertively with hospital care and drugs, etc. It does not mean that all care need stop or not be

taken care of, such as emergency care or a broken arm, etc. All hospices consider the patient and family together as the unit of care. The majority of hospice patients are cared for in their own homes or the homes of a loved one. "Home" may also be broadly construed to include services provided in nursing homes, hospitals and prisons.

Typically, a family member serves as the primary caregiver and, when appropriate, helps make decisions for the terminally ill individual. Members of the hospice staff make regular visits to assess the patient and provide additional care or other services. Hospice staff is on-call 24 hours a day, seven days a week.

Who is the Hospice Team?

Hospice care is a family-centered approach that includes, at a minimum, a team of doctors, nurses, social workers, counselors, and trained volunteers. They work together focusing on the dying patient's needs; physical, psychological, or spiritual. The goal is to help keep the patient as pain-free as possible, with loved ones nearby until death. The team develops a care plan that meets each patient's individual needs for pain management and symptom control.

It is important to find out what the role of the patient's primary doctor will be once the patient begins receiving hospice care. Most often, hospice patients can choose to have their personal doctor involved in the medical care. Both the patient's physician and the hospice medical director may work together to coordinate the patient's medical care, especially when symptoms are difficult to manage. Regardless, a physician's involvement is important to ensure quality hospice care. The hospice medical director is also available to answer questions you or the patient may have regarding hospice medical care.

The team usually consists of the:

- Patient's personal physician; Hospice physician (or medical director); Nurses; Home health aides;
- Social workers; Clergy or other counselors; Trained volunteers and family members;
- Speech, Physical, and Occupational therapists, if needed.

What Services Does the Hospice Team Provide?

On-call 24 hours a day, among its major responsibilities, the interdisciplinary hospice team:

- Manages the patient's pain and symptoms;
- Assists the patient, family and caregiver with the emotional and psychosocial and spiritual aspects of dying;
- Provides needed medications, medical supplies, and equipment;
- Coaches the family on how to care for the patient;
- Delivers special services like speech and physical therapy when needed;
- Makes short-term inpatient care available when pain or symptoms become too difficult to manage at home, or the caregiver needs respite time; and
- Provides bereavement care and counseling to surviving family and friends.

In many cases, family members or loved ones are the patient's primary care givers. Additionally, hospice recognizes that loved ones have their own special needs for support. As a relationship with the hospice begins, hospice staff will want to know about the primary caregiver's priorities. They will also want to know how best to support the patient and family during this time. Support can take many different forms, including visits with the patient and family members; telephone calls about the patient's condition to loved ones, including family members who live at a distance; and the provision of volunteers to assist with patient and family needs.

Counseling services for the patient and loved ones are an important part of hospice care. Bereavement support is offered to families for at least one year after the patient's death. Grief is a reaction to loss and is often expressed by feelings such as anger, guilt, sadness or loneliness. But grief affects us in other ways as well - spiritually, behaviorally, physically. Bereavement is the way we process grief. It is best to think of the grieving process not as a timeline but as a roller coaster, full of ups and downs, highs and lows. Since grief is so stressful, it helps to take good care of yourself and also to share your feelings. There also are guideline for helping a child deal with death.

Your local hospice services can take a variety of forms, including telephone calls, visits, written materials about grieving, and support groups. Individual counseling may be offered by the hospice or the hospice may make a referral. Las Clinicas del Norte can provide additional information on services available.

Interview with Community Resource

Two years ago Sharon Leftwich, RN, BSN started the Santa Fe and Espanola branches of Ambercare Hospice, a New Mexico hospice care company also located in Las Cruces, Silver City, Belen, and Albuquerque. At this time she runs the Espanola branch which covers areas north through Gallina, east to Truchas and south to Pojoaque.

Sharon Leftwich has been associated with hospice work for the last 20 years of her 30 years in the nursing field. She and her husband feel blessed to complement each other in their work. They became nurses together in Michigan, practiced then in California and now New Mexico, living in Medanales the last 4 years.

Sharon believes her hospice program to be unique in many ways and its services are not marketed, but growing quickly by work of mouth. It is staffed by local people living in Espanola and surrounding communities, most of whom speak Spanish. Family is one the biggest areas of focus for support, which includes education in their decision making choices. Its services include such therapies as massage, healing touch, aromatherapy, music and spiritual counselors who make visits. Grief and homicide survivors support groups are offered monthly and are open to the community.

Dr. Kathleen Maley of our LCDN Medical Department is their medical director. Ambercare takes indigent patients and no one is refused service if not covered by insurance.

Las Comunidades begins a CFRP project

Las Comunidades, which has been reorganizing with the support of the National Forest Foundation, has received a four-year grant from the US Forest Service for "A Collaborative Forest Restoration Project (CFRP) for the Vallecitos Federal Sustained Yield Unit".

The goal of the project is to prevent catastrophic wildfires and restore forest and watershed health through a multi-year process of analysis, education, planning and implementation that supports economic development and environmentally sound use of forest materials. Local youth are being trained in environmental monitoring by Forest Guild. A post peeler has been purchased and wood from thinning projects is being converted into posts, vigas and latillas.
