May is Skin Cancer Awareness Month ~

Free Skin Cancer Checks for New Patients at the El Rito Clinic May 20th and 21st 2016

Please join with Las Clinicas del Norte and the National Council on Skin Cancer Prevention in celebrating *National Don't Fry Day, (May 27, 2016)* which promotes and encourages sun safety awareness and reminds everyone to protect their skin while enjoying the outdoors.

Las Clinicas del Norte (El Rito clinic only) will be offering free skin cancer checks for new patients on Friday May 20th from 8 am to 6:00 pm and Saturday May 21st from 7:30 to 3:30 pm. The skin checks will be conducted by Ms. Jeanne Alvarez, FNP, CWS, DNC. Ms Alvarez has achieved a certification in Dermatology Nursing and is a Fellow in Wound Care from the American Board of Wound Management.

According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, (CDC) skin cancer is the most common cancer in the United States. Every hour a patient dies from skin cancer. Unprotected skin can be damaged by the sun's ultraviolet rays in as little as 15 minutes of exposure, yet it can take as long as 12 hours for the skin to show the full effect of the exposure.

Several risk factors in developing skin cancer are:

- Family history of skin cancer
- A lighter natural skin color
- A personal history of skin cancer
- Exposure to the sun through work and/or play
- A history of sunburn, especially early in life
- Indoor tanning
- Skin that burns, freckles, reddens easily or becomes painful in the sun
- Blue or green eyes

- Blond or red hair
- Certain types and/or a large number of moles

There are several types of skin cancer, each require diagnosis, monitoring and treatment by a medical provider.

- Basal Cell Carcinoma, (BCC): The most frequently occurring type of skin cancer. BCC rarely spreads beyond the original tumor site; only in rare cases will the cancer spread and become life threatening.
- Squamous Cell Carcinoma, (SCC): Squamous Cell Carcinoma may become deadly if allowed to grow. The incidence of SCC has increased 20% in the past 3 decades. SCC may occur on all areas of the body including mucous membranes and the genital area; however the most common sites are the areas frequently exposed to the sun, (ears, scalp, face, neck, hands, arms and legs).
- Melanoma: The most dangerous form of skin cancer. Melanoma kills on an annual basis an estimated 10,130 people in the United States. In young adults' ages 15-29 years of age, Melanoma is the second most common form of cancer. Melanoma is mainly caused by intense occasional UV exposure which frequently leads to sun burn. A simple way to remember the signs of Melanoma is to remember the A-B-C-D-E's.
 - A = Asymmetrical, does the mole or spot have an irregular shape with two parts that look very different?
 - **B** = **Boarder**, is the boarder irregular, jagged?
 - C = Color, is it uneven?
 - **D** = **Diameter**, is the mole or spot larger than the size of a pea?
 - **E** = **Evolving**, has the mole or spot changed during the past few weeks or months?

Cont'd— Skin Cancer Awareness

Precancerous or Actinic Keratosis is a skin condition characterized by dry scaly patches or spots on the skin, most commonly on the areas exposed to sun. If left unmonitored, Actinic Keratosis may progress to a **Squamous Cell Carcinoma.**

Don't delay make an appointment today to have a skin check today!

With summer just around the corner there are steps you can take to protect yourself, family and friends. Remember even on cool and cloudy days you need to protect your skin, it's not the temperature but the ultraviolet rays, known as UV rays, that cause the damage.

- Seek shade especially during the middle part of the day
- Cover up with clothing to protect exposed skin
- Wear a hat with a wide brim to shade your face, head, hears and neck
- Wear sunglasses that wrap around your head
- Apply and reapply sunscreen at least every 2 hours and after swimming, sweating or exercising
